TO CELEBRATE LIFE AWARDS \$366,500 IN GRANTS TO 21 BAY AREA ORGANIZATIONS

THE 14TH ANNUAL GRANTS RECEPTION WAS A VIBRANT OCCASION DEDICATED TO NONPROFIT AGENCIES SUPPORTING WOMEN, MEN AND FAMILIES LIVING WITH BREAST CANCER IN OUR COMMUNITIES.

To Celebrate Life Breast Cancer Foundation awarded \$366,500 in grants this year to 21 Bay Area agencies – two more than in 2007 – for breast cancer screening, education and critically needed support services. That brings our total to more than \$2.3 million in grant funding to Bay Area nonprofits since our inception.

To Celebrate Life's outreach extends to nine Bay Area counties. We raise our grant funds primarily through three major annual events – *Tee It Up to Celebrate Life*, *Rally to Celebrate Life* and *Stepping Out to Celebrate Life*. We engage the community in our work – from our donors and volunteers to our events, community members embody the hope and spirit that inspire the Foundation.

"I feel deeply moved and grateful to our donors, sponsors, supporters and volunteers," said Susan Belling, 2008 Grants Chair, at the annual grants reception held April 8 at the Acqua Hotel in Mill Valley. "Every year they step up with

passion, dedication and commitment to help meet the challenges that face the women, men and their families living with this diagnosis."

These nonprofit agencies offer such programs as advocacy, counseling, multilingual partnering, practical assistance, referrals, preventive care and holistic approaches that reduce emotional stress and side effects of treatment. Many of the organizations work primarily with low-income and uninsured families and immigrant communities who do not have access to health care.

SUPPORT FOR WOMEN UNDER 40 IN THE SOUTH BAY

The Gabriella Patser Program is part of the Breast Cancer Connections organization in Palo Alto and Santa Clara County (formerly the Community Breast Health Project). It focuses on women under 40 with a suspicious lump or a history of breast cancer – yet, importantly, women who typically would not follow up with their doctor's advice for additional diagnostic services. Most of the women who are referred to Patser come from Planned Parenthood, community clinics or public health agencies.

Last year the Patser program served 348 women – and four of them had a positive diagnosis for breast cancer. Most of these women do not have health insurance, are underinsured or for cultural or personal reasons are reluctant to seek further medical care. The Patser program provides resources, assistance and referrals for financial hardship (including food, utility bills, rent or mortgage assistance), help with diagnostic services such as imaging, assistance with insurance and emotional support.

Jennifer Gonzales, 23, is one of the beneficiaries. An uninsured graduate student at San Jose State University, she had a lump in her breast for a year before she went to Planned Parenthood for an examination. She was asked to return in six months, which she did, with a greater sense of urgency and anxiety. Planned Parenthood then referred Jennifer to the Gabriella Patser Program, and things began to move very fast. "I don't like hospitals but everyone was so friendly and helpful, it didn't faze me!" Gonzales said, recalling her lumpectomy surgery. In fact, the week before her surgery, everyone called her, including the surgeon, the Patser staff and volunteers

and even the anesthesiologist. "I just never thought that I could have such a good experience – even though it was for something like breast cancer," she said.

Among the formidable programs in action is a buddy system that matches up a former breast cancer survivor with a current patient experiencing similar circumstances. Currently there are 100 such partners. In addition, a medical information specialist helps clients understand their pathology and recommended treatment. A help line and support groups are among other services.

To Celebrate Life's support for the Patser Program has been influential in other ways. Cheri Livingston, the Acting Executive Director of the Gabriella Patser Program, said her organization started a fashion show modeled after our *Stepping Out to Celebrate Life*. This event, "Fit for Life," will have an Asian theme this year in recognition of the Summer Olympics in Beijing.

profiles of Grant Recipients...

HOPE TO THE UNDERSERVED IN WEST MARIN

COASTAL HEALTH ALLIANCE, WHICH BEGAN AS PT. REYES MEDICAL CLINIC IN 1981, PROVIDES THREE-FOURTHS OF THE MEDICAL CARE IN WEST MARIN. ABOUT 42 PERCENT OF ITS PATIENTS HAVE NO INSURANCE, AND THE NUMBER IS GROWING.

The alliance's cancer outreach efforts grew out of grassroots activities of a small group of cancer survivors and their friends in the rural area. They held community meetings that brought to the surface their anxieties and fears about breast cancer.

These survivors and their supportive friends were adamant about getting the message out that women should be screened routinely for breast cancer, do self-exams and pay attention to risk factors. They committed themselves to give the community practical information about what individuals could do to reduce

their anxiety rather than resort to denial. Their realization was, "If this could happen to me, it can happen to anyone. We want to take action to raise the awareness of our neighbors and friends and to do outreach to the Hispanic community in West Marin."

About 25 percent of the alliance's clients are Hispanic and typically communicate in Spanish.

"Your grant gives us the freedom to reach out to underserved and uninsured women and men," said John Severson, Executive Director for the past 13 years. "Otherwise they might not have access to the comprehensive screening, diagnostic tools, education, referrals and personal follow-up we provide by sending our clinicians into the field."

SCREENING RIGHT IN THEIR COMMUNITIES

"Since the Mobile Mammography Unit that used to come to West Marin was discontinued, we felt a strong need to reach out to the underserved and uninsured," he said. "We needed the funds to send clinicians directly into the communities to devote substantial time to those who needed to be screened but might be reluctant or afraid to come to a clinic."

The alliance also networks with other organizations working with the same population. Identify people who might need assistance. Cuts in state and federal health care programs and economic downturns leave these West Marin residents particularly vulnerable. "We value those who partner with us like *To Celebrate Life*," Severson said. "Your grant translates into immediate help for our clients."

COOKING FOR BREAST CANCER FAMILIES

A mother's request to teach her teen daughter to cook was the catalyst for a new, fast-growing breast cancer support service—The Ceres Community Project. Teen volunteers cook healthy and organic meals for breast cancer patients and their families in Sonoma.

Ceres Director Cathryn Couch had run a home delivery meal service in Marin and Sonoma for 10 years previously, so she was a good candidate to give that teen girl cooking and work experience. "A light bulb went on" as Couch thought about how she could make this a meaningful learning experience—she recalled earlier breast cancer survivors she had cooked for as a friend, and so she and the young girl began cooking for just a few families.

Just 20 months after that first teaching effort, Ceres currently serves about 20 families a week and expects to cook 15,000 meals in its second full year of operation. Over 40 teen volunteers—young men and women—from eight area high schools prepare and help deliver the food. This is double the meals served in Ceres' first year, 2007, when *To Celebrate Life Breast Cancer Foundation* first supported Ceres. Our grant became seed money to help launch this unique program.

HEALTHY, SEASONAL FOODS

All the food is organic and healthy—seasonal foods like artichokes and asparagus right now, always with grains like brown rice and quinoa, and no refined sugars or flours. A favorite dish is a seaweed and kale salad which "tastes incredibly yummy and your body feels really good after you eat it," said Couch. The teen volunteers are learning to cook without recipes for the most part—most of the food is donated, and so they don't always have all of a recipe's ingredients.

Anna Stufflebeam is a longtime volunteer, part of one of Ceres' cooking teams with her sister and their two best friends. "We all love to cook, but to be cooking together, to help other families heal, is just a wonderful feeling," she said. And their work hits close to home—they are cooking for a neighbor family that "wasn't expecting this kind of help," she added.

"When a community gathers together, it can do really amazing things," Couch said. "The kitchen we are using was sitting empty. We have many, many local food providers who are donating food to us. And these kids are having a powerful experience, learning how to cook and making a difference in the world."

Now Couch's team is looking for a permanent kitchen. "We want it to be someplace that has a warm and nurturing environment—we plan on bringing cancer patients there to do cooking classes, and we plan to grow food there, too."

ALLISON'S STORY

Allison Scott has been a recipient of Ceres' service since January. "It's so wonderful to have food already made for me. I just wouldn't take the time to make meals that are that delicious and healthy on my own."

One of her favorites—"this incredible immune broth, all organic and incredibly delicious. It's got seaweed, a healthy bark called astrolagus, yams and onion. They give you the bag of vegetables so you can make it yourself and have a fresh amount every day."

Scott also took a cooking class from Ceres to help her make some of her meals.

She's gotten a "clean food" cookbook with recipes used by Ceres. "Clean food" recipes are prepared in harmony with the seasons and take advantage of the highly nutritious foods provided by Mother Nature—whole grains, vegetables, legumes, sea vegetables, nuts and seeds.

Scott has a second source of the same "clean cooking" skills—her teenage son Dylan is a volunteer cook for Ceres. For the Scotts, being part of this Sonoma community effort is all in the family.

For the past two years, DHL has been one of the major corporate sponsors of *Tee It Up to Celebrate Life*, one of the annual fundraising events of *To Celebrate Life Breast Cancer Foundation*.

"Health and wellness is one of our priorities," said Lynne Koreman, Senior Director, Sponsorship Marketing and Corporate Citizenship, for DHL Express at its Plantation, Florida, headquarters. "We were impressed that you are a volunteer organization. The sustaining role of the business community's philanthropy toward the Bay Area through *To Celebrate Life* is especially vital to the people we serve. "We believe strongly in corporate social responsibility, and it's a pleasure to be associated with activities like *Tee It Up* to fulfill our goals for our communities," she said.

RALLY GOES GREEN

Rally to Celebrate Life has chosen the theme "Rally Goes Green" for this year's tennis tournament on September 15. Event organizers plan to eliminate as much paper and plastic as possible and recycle event materials.

Already Trader Joe's has donated 250 "green" grocery bags to go into *Rally's* gift bags. Event organizers will also reduce paper by emailing "save the date" notices and encouraging online registration.

Throughout *To Celebrate Life*, event committees have been encouraged to follow this example and come up with additional ways of showing environmental responsibility, such as minimizing unnecessary paper correspondence and mailings.

We know there is a lot more to being "green" than recycling. As environmental stewards, we can maintain the spirit of celebrating life – in fact, we can enhance it!

WINE, WOMEN & SONG – PERFORMING FOR THE GREATER GOOD

Wine, Women & Song was born in response to two bouts of cancer in Bay Area actress and singer Susan Zelinsky's family. Her mother was undergoing breast cancer treatment when her stepmother was diagnosed with a brain tumor.

After lending a hand during her mother's recovery, and while grieving the loss of her stepmother, Zelinsky – popularly known as "Susan Z" – decided to strike back and put on a concert to raise money for breast cancer charities.

She was performing at a Sonoma Valley winery when the phrase "wine, women and song" popped into her head. With a snappy name ready, all she needed was to work up the nerve to produce a benefit show. It took her about two years of talking about the fundraiser before she began taking steps to make it happen.

All of the bands she called were willing to play for free. And a hardy group of volunteers quickly helped her manage the logistics – Eileen Grady, Ualtar O'Regan, Austin Wondolowski, Emily Navarre and Bob McGregor.

Susan Z was thrilled when their first concert brought in over \$1,500. In ten years, the events have brought in more than \$90,000, all of which has been presented to *Rally to Celebrate Life* and Zero Breast Cancer, a research organization.

"Eileen Grady is my right hand, and usually my left as well," Zelinsky said. After Susan Z played Eliza Doolittle in the Mountain Play's production of *My Fair Lady*, she and Grady decided to expand their roster of performances. They recruited cast members from the musical and put on an evening of Broadway show tunes, which Eileen dubbed "the Breast of Broadway."

Now the volunteers do two shows every year, "BoB" and the "Wine, Women & Song Rack Show." Notes Zelinsky: "I'm proud when I read about where the money goes – like the good work that *Rally* does."
